Brenda is the author of the award-winning books, Cool Plants for Cold Climates: A Garden Designer's Perspective (University of Alaska Press, 2017) and There's a Moose in My Garden: Designing Gardens in Alaska and the Far North (University of Alaska Press, 2013).

She is also the award-winning designer of Gardens By Design, Alaska's premier garden design firm. She has designed over 200 unique and personalized gardens for both residential and commercial clients in Alaska. Brenda's designs have received several prestigious awards in the Perennial Plant Association's annual international competition. The awards recognize projects that are exemplary in the use of herbaceous perennials to help create balance and beauty in landscape design. She, her book, and her designs have been featured in numerous publications and she is a frequent guest on radio offering advice to gardeners.

Discover Salvias Kit Haesloop

hen visitors to the NPA Border at the Bellevue Botanical Garden (BBG) ask where they can see hummingbirds, we direct them to the northern-most bed in the Border that is loaded with salvias. When one thinks of the genus Salvia or sage, it is so often the red and white flowered Salvia microphylla 'Hot Lips' made popular by Ciscoe Morris that comes to mind, and hummingbirds just love them. NPA also grows 'Hot Lips' in a container in our

propagation yard at BBG, so that we have hummingbirds visiting while we work.

However, at the Hardy Plant Study Weekend in June, speaker Jimi Blake (from Ireland) opened our eyes to the full extent of the Salvia genus. He gave a special 30-minute talk on salvias. We learned from Jimi that the genus includes plants that grow in the shade, sun and greenhouse. Flower colors cover the entire rainbow from white, red, orange, yellow, blues and purples, even to black calyxes with green petals. They often will bloom from June until frost, with some varieties blooming in the greenhouse in the winter. They can be small enough for the rock garden or over 4 feet tall – there are even climbers! – with most being about 2 feet tall. Some

have fragrant foliage and many sages have culinary uses. Salvias can be easily grown from seed or propagated by cuttings or divisions. Some forms are a sub-shrub and woody like *Salvia microphylla* 'Hot Lips', while many behave like a normal herbaceous perennial and die back for the winter, sending up new growth in the spring.

Salvias growing in the sun don't want to be crowded by neighboring plants, so give them space. For hardy perennial salvias, if your soil is clay, plant on a hillside or amend your soil for good drainage, so that the roots don't rot in the winter wet. This applies to many garden plants, so properly amend your soil.

NPA grows Salvia glabrescens 'Shi Ho' in the border. The blooms add color to the garden starting in September and often blooming into November, but even if it didn't flower, the leaves are a beautiful lime green to dark green and have an interesting shape and texture. Salvia koyamae grows in the shady and moist section of the NPA border. Its soft yellow flowers and large leaves brighten up the shadows.

A couple favorites of the author are *Salvia* 'Black and Blue' and *Salvia hians*. True to its name *Salvia* 'Black and Blue' has stunning, dark blue flowers with black calyxes. *Salvia hians* happily survives and blooms in inhospitable places in the garden and shrugs off our hot dry summers. Hummingbirds fuss and fight over access to its flowers.

Salvias are worth discovering to bring summer color and humming-birds to your garden. NPA will have *Salvia hians* seeds along with other plant seeds for sale at our lectures in September and October.

LIFE IN THE GARDEN

RECIPES FOR LOVE AND MURDER: A Tannie Maria Mystery by Sally Andrew


I've talked with many of the readers of this column, and I know for a fact that there are an awful lot of mystery fans among you. So I'm taking this

Portland and Beyond!

his spring thirty-five Harbor Gardeners trekked south to the beautiful Willamette Valley for a garden- and laughter-saturated 3-day bus trip. The club has taken an annual trip for the past five years, choosing a unique itinerary each time. One year it was Victoria, last year, Bellingham – this year took us on our third trip to Portland and beyond.

Our annual trip tradition began when several of our members attended a day trip sponsored by a nearby garden club. "We should do this!" exclaimed one of our enthusiastic companions, and at our annual planning meeting we decided to make it a 2-nighter.

That first year, I accepted the responsibility of doing all the arranging and planning, as I had trip planning experience in a previous life. Since that first trip, a committee of four plans and executes the trip as their contribution to our club activities. Each committee member has a specific job, with much spillover and cooperation. Basically, one member arranges private gardens to visit and books commercial growers and nurseries. One handles all the money, the budget and registration forms, another researches and makes hotel reservations while the fourth is in charge of bus hosting, seat prizes, snacks, happy hours, etc. There are multiple tasks which require input from all committee members, such as the final

decision on the itinerary and meal arrangements. A graphics-skilled member handles promotional materials. Costs are held down appreciably because we are all volunteers. Having an established working relationship with a coach company and a garden resort has been helpful. On the way home we poll our participants for ideas and

suggestions. This information is used to plan the following year's trip, which is how we decided to go back to Oregon again this spring.

On June 5, we loaded the 40-foot coach which would serve as our transportation for the next 3 days, giddy at the prospect of all those gardens and nurseries ahead of us. On that first day we visited the inspiring gardens of Nancy Goldman in NE Portland, and Lucy Hardiman, who uses her garden to benefit others less fortunate than herself, and in between squeezed in a visit to a garden shop. On Wednesday, we managed to visit four separate nurseries

specializing in everything from peonies to geraniums, several of which included beautiful display gardens. By Thursday, the undercarriage of the bus was so full of plants that we had to transfer all of our luggage into the bus itself! That day we visited Thomas Vetter's packed semiurban garden, took in yet more unique nurseries, and headed home.
